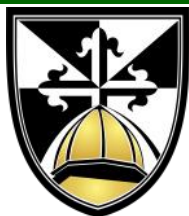

Frequency of Holy Communion

Needless to say, the pandemic has affected how often most Catholics can, or even have the option, to receive the Eucharist. The longer the disruption of COVID-19 goes on, the more acutely many of you miss the weekly, or even daily, reception of Holy Communion. And now, the fires in our state add a further layer of complication in our celebration of the Mass outside (not to mention Baptisms, weddings, and funerals). I thought it might be helpful to know a little bit about the history of how often members of the Church have received the Eucharist throughout history. The following are excerpts from the 1917 *Catholic Encyclopedia's* article, Frequent Communion (<https://www.newadvent.org/cathen/06278a.htm>). In the interest of space, I have removed the frequent references to source material.

"In the early Church at Jerusalem the faithful received every day. Later on, however, we read that St. Paul remained at Troas for seven days, and it was only 'on the first day of the week' that the faithful 'assembled to break bread.' According to the 'Didache' the breaking of bread took place on 'the Lord's day'. Pliny says that the Christians assembled 'on a fixed day'; and St. Justin, 'on the day called Sunday'. It is in Tertullian that we first read of the Liturgy being celebrated on any other day besides Sunday...

"St. Augustine sums up the matter thus: 'Some receive the Body and Blood of the Lord every day; others on certain days; in some places there is no day on which the Sacrifice is not offered; in others on Saturday and Sunday only; in others on Sunday alone'... Good Christians still communicated once a week, down to the time of Charlemagne, but after the break-up of his empire this custom came to an end. St. Bede bears witness to the Roman practice of communicating on Sundays and on the feasts of the Apostles and Martyrs, and laments the rarity of reception in England.

"Strange to say, it was in the Middle Ages, 'the Ages of Faith', that Communion was less frequent than at any other period of the Church's history. The Fourth Lateran Council compelled the faithful, under pain of excommunication, to receive at least once a year. The Poor Clares, by rule, communicated six times a year; the Dominicanesses [presumably, the cloistered Nuns], fifteen times; the Third Order of St. Dominic, four times. Even saints received rarely: St. Louis six times a year, St. Elizabeth only three times. The teaching of the great theologians, however, was all on the side of frequent, and to some extent daily, Communion. Various reformers, Tauler, St. Catherine of Siena, St. Vincent Ferrer, and Savonarola, advocated, and in many instances brought about, a return to frequent reception... This practice, too, was warmly recommended by [Bl.] Pius IX and Leo XIII, and finally received official approval from [St.] Pius X."

Dominican Saint of the Week

August 31-September 6, 2020

September 2nd - **Blessed Guala de Roniis, Friar and Bishop**

Born Guala de Roniis in 1180 in the Bergamo province and he belonged to a famed Roman house. He was an excellent student and his parents had great hopes for his future. Blessed Guala de Roniis was one of St. Dominic's earliest followers. After hearing St. Dominic preach in 1219, he decided to join the new order and received the habit from St. Dominic himself. After St. Dominic's death he was appointed Bishop of Brescia. Bl. Guala was a talented negotiator and was appointed by two popes as a papal legate. Later in life Bl. Guala retreated to San Sepolero d'Astino where - despite his retreat into peaceful solitude - people still flocked to see him in order to seek his wise counsel. Blessed Guala died on September 3rd, 1244.

September 2nd - **Saint Ingrid of Skanninge, widow and nun**

St. Ingrid was the daughter of El of a member of the Swedish nobility. She had two brothers and a sister; her sister was the mother of St. Bridget of Sweden. It is believed that St. Ingrid was the inspiration of her niece. St. Ingrid was married to a nobleman Sir Sigge, who died in 1271. After being widowed, St Ingrid and her sister became a part of a circle of pious females around the Dominican friar, Petrus de Dacia in Skanninge. Petrus in his letters tells us of the pious life of and mystic revelations of his spiritual daughter. In 1272 St. Ingrid with some other pious women formed a convent, adopting the habit of the Dominicans and practicing its rule. St. Ingrid made pilgrimages to Santiago de Compostela, Jerusalem, and Rome. Her convent was formally recognized in 1281. St. Ingrid died on September 9, 1282. It is interesting to note, following the Swedish reformation the saints remains were moved to the Vadstena Abbey in 1645. Her skull was stolen from the church by Antoine de Beaulieu who thought it was the skull of St Bridget. The skull has changed hands many times since then and as late as 1959, it has been exhibited as the skull of Bridget of Sweden, in the Bridgettine abbey of Mary's Refuge in Uden, Netherlands. I guess two heads are better than none.

September 4th - **Blessed Catherine Mattei of Racconigi, lay Dominican and Virgin.**

Bl. Catherine was born in 1489 in Racconigi, Piedmont to a poor family. She was a pious child and at the age of 9 she had a vision of Jesus as a child of ten. She had other visions of saints including the Dominicans St. Catherine of Siena and Peter Martyr. The Virgin Mary told her that Jesus wanted her to be his bride and gave her a wedding ring only she could see. Bl. Catherine wished to join the Dominican order but was opposed by her family, so she joined the third Order as a tertiary. As the visions increased, she received the stigmata although the wounds were not visible until her death. Her mystical experiences roused a storm of gossip among her neighbors, who were terrified at the lights and sounds that came from her home; even the Dominican friars began to ostracize her. Eventually she was forced out of the town and settled in the city of Racconigi. During her lifetime Bl. Catherine was sought for counsel and prayer, many miracles are attributed to her in both life and after her death in 1574. Bl. Catherine Mattei, pray for us.
