Dear sisters and brothers of St. Dominic Parish,

Even during these challenging times, there is hope and Good News to spread! As you may recall, last weekend we invited everyone to participate in the Rosary Sunday: Dominican Student Appeal and asked for your help in supporting the education and formation of your future Dominican priests and religious brothers.

If you made a gift to the Appeal already, please accept my heartfelt thanks, and the thanks of all my Dominican brothers.

If you economic situation is stable and you have not, I ask you to please consider a gift at <u>www.opwest.org/</u> <u>rs</u> or mail it directly to: Western Dominican Province, 5877 Birch Court, Oakland, CA 94618. Unfortunately, due to a COVID outbreak at the printer, the envelopes mailed directly to you will not arrive until next week. You can use those too.

Thanks be to God, the Western Dominican Province has been experiencing a vocation increase over the last 5 years, and we now have more men in formation than in the last 20 years. But the formation of these 36 good men is hard work and requires the support of many people. It costs, on average, about \$52,500 per student brother per year to fund their room, board, formation, graduate education and healthcare. (That means this year's costs will be around \$2 million.) These funds are stretched far, but without your support, we wouldn't have the means to train them for their lives of service.

What's more, we Dominicans do not receive support from this or any diocese in which we serve for the formation of our student brothers (our "seminarians"). We rely entirely on friends like you.

Quite frankly, it is not possible for us to nurture and guide our Student Brothers' vocations without your support and God's grace. We are grateful that we receive both in abundance.





## **Dominican Saints of the Week**

October 11th - **Blessed James Griesinger** of Ulm, Friar and Religious



Blessed James was born in the year 1407 in Swabia, which is now a part of Germany. James became a soldier in Naples in 1432 after having stopped in Bologna. Then he

went on a pilgrimage to Rome to visit the tombs of Saint Peter and Saint Paul. After his visit to Rome, he became disillusioned with the soldiering life and became a private aid to a solicitor in Capua in 1437. He became a member of the order of preachers in Bologna in 1441. James spent the remainder of his life working in the art of stained glass and painting images on Church windows. He died on October 11th, 1491 and was buried in the Basilica of San Domingo. His remains were later moved in 1965 to another chapel in the same church. He was beatified by Pope Leo the 12th on August 3rd, 1825. Blessed James Griesinger of Ulm, pray for us.

## October 13th - **Blessed Magdalen Pannatieri**, Lay Dominican and Virgin

Blessed Magdalen was born in Torino in 1443 and as a child, she fostered a great devotion to Saint Catherine of preachers in 1463 as a tertiary. She made a private vow as a child to remain chaste. She was very fond of children and had a way of explaining Christian dogma simply. Magdalen's talks attracted priests, nuns, and other lay people as she made the gospel easy to understand. She spent her mornings in Eucharistic adoration while her afternoon she was administering to both the ill and the poor. She became noted for her austerities which included wearing a rough woolen shirt and her very long fasts. She was said to have received the stigmata although this was kept secret until after her death. Blessed Magdalen died on October 13th, 1503 in Torino on her deathbed she said:" I could not be happy in heaven if you were not with me there too", to those assembled near her bedside. She was beatified by Leo the 12th, on September 26th, 1827. Blessed Magdalen Pannatieri, pray for us.

October 14th - Blessed Marie Poussepin, Sister and Virgin

Blessed Marie was born October 14th, 1653 in France. She spent her early childhood caring for her mother who died at the age of 22. She was going to join a contemplative order, but then her father became ill requiring her to stay at home. After his death she became an active Tertiary of the Dominican Order. She tried to form a branch of the Dominican Sisters of Charity in Angerville, but due to the



dislike of a local Bishop the congregation was not immediately formed or affiliated with the Dominican order. The group instead became known as Jacobines. As leader of the group, Mary opened many elementary schools and reformed Healthcare in rural France. Despite her efforts, Mary was never able to have the Jacobines recognized by the Dominican order in her lifetime. She died in 1744. Finally in 1897, the Jacobines were formally recognized and became officially named the Dominican Sisters of Charity of the Presentation of the Most Blessed Virgin Mary. She was beatified by Pope John Paul II November 20th, 1994. Blessed Marie Poussepin, pray for us.


### **Youth Ministry Rosary Walk & Knots 4 Love**

#### Peaceful, prayerful, effective 40 Days for Life campaign to build on successes in Vallejo/Benicia/ American Canyon CA

Valleio/Benicia/American Canyon CA – Beginning September 23<sup>rd</sup> thru November 1<sup>st</sup> 2020 we will be conducting our 40 Days For Life prayer vigil. Due to the COVID concerns and smoke problems from the CA fires we are proposing three ways you can participate in focused prayer for an end to abortion, for conversion of hearts, for mothers and fathers who feel they have no other choice, and for the unborn child who's very life is at risk. 1.) Focused visible prayer on the sidewalk of PP in Vallejo. Masks must be worn and people must be 6' apart, or you can park and pray in your car. 2.) We are offering a virtual-Zoom prayer hour each day at 3:00 pm during the vigil. Login info will be sent to those who wish to pray in this format. 3.) Please consider to commit to one hour in front of the Tabernacle at St. Dominic's, offering your prayers for this most important cause for life. 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## The Challenge of Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship

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#### Part I of II: Our Call as Catholic Citizens

This brief document is Part I of a summary of the US bishops' reflection, Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship, which complements the teaching of bishops in dioceses and states.

Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship is the teaching document of the Catholic Bishops of the United States on the political responsibility of Catholics. It provides guidance for all who seek to exercise their rights and duties as citizens. As Catholics, we bring the richness of our faith to the public square. We draw from both faith and reason as we seek to affirm the dignity of the human person and the common good of all.

Everyone living in this country is called to participate in public life and contribute to the common good.<sup>1</sup> In *Rejoice and Be Glad* [*Gaudete et exsultate*], Pope Francis writes:

Your identification with Christ and his will involves a commitment to build with him that kingdom of love, justice and universal peace.... You cannot grow in holiness without committing yourself, body and soul, to giving your best to this endeavor.<sup>2</sup>

As Catholics, we are part of a community with profound teachings that help us consider challenges in public life, contribute to greater justice and peace for all people, and evaluate policy positions, party platforms, and candidates' promises and actions in light of the Gospel in order to help build a better world.

#### Why Does the Church Teach About Issues Affecting Public Policy?

The Church's obligation to participate in shaping the moral character of society is a requirement of our faith, a part of the mission given to us by Jesus Christ. As people of both faith and reason, Catholics are called to bring truth to political life and to practice Christ's commandment to "love one another" (Jn 13:34).

The US Constitution protects the right of individual believers and religious bodies to proclaim and live out their faith without government interference, favoritism, or discrimination. Civil law should recognize and protect the Church's right and responsibility to participate in society without abandoning its moral convictions. Our nation's tradition of pluralism is enhanced, not threatened, when religious groups and people of faith bring their convictions into public life. The Catholic community brings to political dialogue a consistent moral framework and broad experience serving those in need.

#### Who in the Church Should Participate in Political Life?

In the Catholic tradition, responsible citizenship is a virtue, and participation in political life is a moral obligation. As Catholics, we should be guided more by our moral convictions than by our attachment to any political party or interest group. In today's environment, Catholics may feel politically disenfranchised, sensing that no party and few candidates fully share our comprehensive commitment to human life and dignity. This should not discourage us. On the contrary, it makes our obligation to act all the more urgent. Catholic lay women and men need to act on the Church's moral principles and become more involved: running for office, working within political parties, and communicating concerns to elected officials. Even those who cannot vote should raise their voices on matters that affect their lives and the common good. Faithful citizenship is an ongoing responsibility, not just an election year duty.

#### How Can Catholic Social Teaching Help Guide Our Participation?

In the words of Pope Francis, "progress in building a people in peace, justice and fratemity depends on four principles related to constant tensions present in every social reality. These derive from the pillars of the Church's social doctrine, which serve as 'primary and fundamental parameters of reference for interpreting and evaluating social phenomena."<sup>19</sup> The four principles include the dignity of the human person, the common good, subsidiarity, and solidarity. Taken together, these principles provide a moral framework for Catholic engagement in advancing what we have called a "consistent ethic of life" (*Living the Gospel of Life*, no. 22).

Rightly understood, this ethic does not treat all issues as morally equivalent; nor does it reduce Catholic teaching to one or two issues. It anchors the Catholic commitment to defend human life and other human rights, from conception until natural death, in the fundamental obligation to respect the dignity of every human being as a child of God.

Catholic voters should use Catholic teaching to examine candidates' positions on issues and should consider candidates' integrity, philosophy, and performance. It is important for all citizens "to see beyond party politics, to analyze campaign rhetoric critically, and to choose their political leaders according to principle, not party affiliation or mere self-interest" (USCCB, *Living the Gospel of Life*, no. 33). The following summary of the four principles highlights several themes of Catholic social teaching for special consideration: these include human rights and responsibilities, respect for work and the rights of workers, care for God's creation, and the preferential option for the poor and vulnerable.<sup>4</sup>

#### The Dignity of the Human Person

Human life is sacred because every person is created in the image and likeness of God. There is a rich and multifaceted Catholic teaching on human dignity summarized in the *Compendium of the Social Doctrine of the Church.* Every human being "*must always be understood in his unrepeatable and inviolable uniqueness* . . . This entails above all the requirement not only of simple respect on the part of others, especially political and social institutions and their leaders with regard to every man and woman on the earth, but even more, this means that the primary commitment of each person towards others, and particularly of these same institutions, must be for the promotion and integral development of the person" (no. 131). The *Compendium* continues, "It is necessary to 'consider every neighbor without exception as another self, taking into account first of all his life and the means necessary for living it with dignity' (*Gaudium et Spes*, no. 27).

Every political, economic, social, scientific and cultural program must be inspired by the awareness of the primacy of each human being over society."<sup>5</sup>

#### Subsidiarity

It is impossible to promote the dignity of the person without showing concern for the family, groups, associations, and local realities—in short, for those economic, social, cultural, recreational, professional, and political communities to which people spontaneously give life and which make it possible for them to achieve effective social growth.<sup>6</sup> The family, based on marriage between a man and a woman, is the fundamental unit of society. This sanctuary for the creation and nurturing of children must not be redefined, undermined, or neglected. Supporting families should be a priority for economic and social policies. How our society is organized—in economics and politics, in law and public policy—affects the well-being of individuals and of society. Every person and association has a right and a duty to participate in shaping society to promote the well-being of individuals and the common good.

The principle of subsidiarity reminds us that larger institutions in society should not overwhelm or interfere with smaller or local institutions; yet larger institutions have essential responsibilities when the more local institutions cannot adequately protect human dignity, meet human needs, and advance the common good.<sup>7</sup>

#### The Common Good

The common good is comprised of "the sum total of social conditions which allow people, either as groups or as individuals, to reach their fulfilment more fully and more easily."<sup>8</sup>

Human dignity is respected and the common good is fostered only if human rights are protected and basic responsibilities are met. Every human being has a right to life, a right to religious freedom, and a right to have access to those things required for human decency food and shelter, education and employment, health care and housing. Corresponding to these rights are duties and responsibilities—to ourselves, to our families, and to the larger society.

The economy must serve people, not the other way around. An economic system must serve the dignity of the human person and the common good by respecting the dignity of work and protecting the rights of workers. Economic justice calls for decent work at fair, living wages, a broad and fair legalization program with a path to citizenship for immigrant workers, and the opportunity for all people to work together for the common good through their work, ownership, enterprise, investment, participation in unions, and other forms of economic activity. Workers also have responsibilities—to provide a fair day's work for a fair day's pay, to treat employers and coworkers with respect, and to carry out their work in ways that contribute to the common good. Workers, employers, and unions should not only advance their own interests but also work together to advance economic justice and the well-being of all.

We have a duty to **care for God's creation**, which Pope Francis refers to in *Laudato* Si' as "our common home."<sup>9</sup> We all are called to be careful stewards of God's creation and to ensure a safe and hospitable environment for vulnerable human beings now and in the future. Pope Francis, consistent with St. John Paul II and Pope Benedict XVI (World Day of Peace Message, 1990 and 2010), has lifted up pollution, climate change, lack of access to clean water, and the loss of biodiversity as particular challenges. Pope Francis speaks of an "ecological debt" (no. 51) owed by wealthier nations to developing nations. And he calls all of us to an "ecological conversion" (no. 219), by which "the effects of [our] encounter with Jesus Christ become evident in [our] relationship with the world around [us]".<sup>10</sup> Indeed, this concern with "natural ecology" is an indispensable part of the broader "human ecology," which encompasses not only material but moral and social dimensions as well.

#### Solidarity

Solidarity is "a firm and persevering determination to commit oneself to . . . the good of all and of each individual, because we are *all* really responsible *for all*." It is found in "a commitment to the good of one's neighbor with the readiness, in the Gospel sense, to 'lose oneself' for the sake of the other instead of exploiting him, and to 'serve him' instead of oppressing him for one's own advantage."<sup>11</sup>

We are one human family, whatever our national, racial, ethnic, economic, and ideological differences. Our Catholic commitment to solidarity requires that we pursue justice, eliminate racism, end human trafficking, protect human rights, seek peace, and avoid the use of force except as a necessary last resort.

In a special way, our solidarity must find expression in the preferential option for the poor and vulnerable. A moral test for society is how we treat the weakest among us—the unborn, those dealing with disabilities or terminal illness, the poor, and the marginalized.

#### Conclusion

In light of Catholic teaching, the bishops vigorously repeat their call for a renewed politics that focuses on moral principles, the promotion of human life and dignity, and the pursuit of the common good. Political participation in this spirit reflects not only the social teaching of our Church but the best traditions of our nation.
