We hear in this Sunday's reading from St. Paul, "The world in its present form is passing away" (1 Cor 7:31). This should come as no surprise to us whose imaginations are well-attuned to the apocalyptic. The world is going to end, and, on a more personal note, we are going to die. Fair enough. Left to the speculative realm, these truths are harmless - truisms, really. Brought to the practical realm, however, they tell a different story.

How does one live if one is certain to die? This question inspires anxiety in many, especially in those who think that this life is all there is. For if we live only for successful careers, honors, an abundance of possessions, the experience of this world's joys, or sexual pleasures whether licit or otherwise, then everything about us and our lives would speak not of eternity but of mortality, unable to persist after our death. Accordingly, Death would mean for us the end of all that we conceive of ourselves to be. Death would, therefore, become our greatest horror and would nullify any meaningful answer we could propose to the question of how to live.

Many have glimpsed this fact and so have shut their eyes to death in desperate denial. Their lives consequently reflect their desperation: their weaknesses turn perverse, and their perversions turn wicked. For they proclaim with trembling voices that their lives shall not end, that they are the measure for their own meaning and happiness. Such ones, of course, shall glimpse death once again, only this time it will be there before them, not tranquilized in the security of thought. Seeing their imaginations of a self-made meaning and happiness crumble before death, they might be moved to despair or to anger or, through God's free grace, to conversion.

How Christians are to confront death properly is certainly not to cower before it or to flee from it, nor are we to confront it as an enemy; rather, we confront it as a blessing, calling it, in St. Francis' words, Sister Death. For saints, death is the greatest moment of life on earth, because, through it, they hope at last to see God, who is their happiness. Further, they confront death as something in continuity with the rest of their lives. Throughout their lives, saints have been attentive to God, as a Friend, and they have looked for every opportunity to give Him gifts of love by caring for themselves and their neighbors. To die, then, is for them a final gift they can give God, in union with the crucified Christ, for the salvation of the world.

As flat as it might sound because of its repetition, the answer to the question of how we are to live if we are certain to die, is that we are to love - to love God and to love Him through loving others. Yet this answer serves as the bedrock to any successful attempt at a flourishing, meaningful life.

Dominican Saints and Blesseds of the Week

January 27 - Blessed Marclino of Forli, friar and priest

He was born in Italy in 1317 and entered the Dominican order as a vouth. He loved silence and solitude and was noted for his devotion to the Virgin Mother of God. Marcilino supported the reform efforts of Raymond of Capua. faithfully carried out his priestly ministry and performed works of charity. He was a counselor for many, especially the sick. He died on January 24, 1397 and was beatified on May 9, 1750 by Pope Benedict XIV. Blessed Marclino of Forli pray for us.



January 28 - Saint Thomas Aquinas, friar, priest and Doctor of the Church



He was born circa 1225 in Roccasecca, Kingdom of Sicily. He died on March 7,1274 in Fossanova, Papal States. Thomas was canonized on July 18, 1323 by Pope John XXII, and declared Doctor of the Church by Pope Benedict XV. St. Thomas is most famous for embracing the ideas of Aristotle who he called "the Philosopher" and attempting to synthesize Aristotle in philosophy with the principles of Christianity. His best -known works are "The Disputed Questions On Truth"

and "The Summa Theologica", an unfinished work on the theology of the church. He is regarded as the model teacher for those studying for the priesthood, and indeed the highest expression of both natural reason and speculative theology. In modern times, under papal directives, the study of his work was long used as the core of the required program of study for those seeking ordination as priests or deacons, as well as those in religious formation, and for other students of the sacred disciplines. Saint Thomas Aquinas pray for us.

January 29 - Blessed Vinnana delle Botti, lay Dominican and mother

She was born circa 1332 in Florence. Republic of Florence and died on January 29, 1361. Vinnana was beatified on March 27, 1824 by Pope Leo XII. She was an Italian Roman Catholic professed member of the third Order of Saint Dominic. She turned to the Dominicans after a sudden conversion from a dissolute life and was noted for her simplistic life born out of her conversion. She was a pious and devoted child but after she was married she fell



into secular values rather than following her faith. Vinnana had fierce distractors due to her stating she had religious ecstasies at Mass, which was true, and these opponents had to acknowledg her as a true living Saint. Blessed Villana de Botti pray for us.




St. Dominic's Cemetery
