# **Pastor's Corner**

**Ending Human Trafficking** 

As part of Black History Month, our children at St. Dominic school are learning about the positive and historic contributions African Americans have made to the United States. Those unique and invaluable contributions must be seen in the context of horror of the 18<sup>th</sup> century slave trade, a blatant example of the heinous crime of human trafficking, responsible for bringing so many Africans to the "New World." It is by no means the only example, but it is a painful, sinful part of our nation's history which we can never forget or ignore. And we continue to deal with many forms of racism in our own day.

Monday, February 8 is the optional memorial of St. Josephine Bakhita and the International Day of Prayer for the Victims of Human Trafficking. St. Josephine was kidnapped as a child and sold into slavery in Sudan and Italy. Once Josephine was freed, she became a Canossian sister and dedicated her life to sharing her testament of deliverance from slavery and comforting the poor and suffering. She was declared a saint in 2000.

On December 2, 2014 at the Casina Pio IV, headquarters of the Pontifical Academies of Sciences and Social Sciences, Catholic, Anglican, Muslim, Hindu, Buddhist, Jewish and Orthodox religious leaders signed a Joint Declaration of Religious Leaders Against Modern Slavery as a public statement of their commitment to work together in spiritual and practical action to eradicate this crime against humanity and restore dignity and freedom to its victims.

Perhaps this was the first time that religious leaders came together, adding to their interreligious dialogue, to make a common statement to affirm that the other is like you, that the other must be recognized as such, and that you must treat others as you would have them treat you. You must love your neighbor as yourself. This means upholding and defending the true identity of human beings which is compromised by the globalization of indifference whose gravest consequences can be seen in modern forms of slavery and human trafficking – the systematic deprivation of a person's liberty, and abuse of his or her body, for example through mutilation or organ removal, for the purposes of commercial exploitation. Although their lofty goal was to irrevocably end human trafficking by 2020, it is still sadly very much with us.

Here is the text of declaration:

"We, the undersigned, are gathered here today for a historical initiative to inspire spiritual and practical action by all global faiths and people of good will everywhere to eradicate modern slavery across the world by 2020 and for all time.

"In the eyes of God each human being is a free person, whether girl, boy, woman or man, and is destined to exist for the good of all in equality and fraternity. Modern slavery, in terms of human trafficking, forced labour and prostitution, organ trafficking, and any relationship that fails to respect the fundamental conviction that all people are equal and have the same freedom and dignity, is a crime against humanity.

"We pledge ourselves here today to do all in our power, within our faith communities and beyond, to work together for the freedom of all those who are enslaved and trafficked so that their future may be restored. Today we have the opportunity, awareness, wisdom, innovation and technology to achieve this human and moral imperative." **Fr. Carl Schlichte, O.P.**





# **Dominican Saints and Blesseds of the Week**

February 7 Anniversary of Deceased Fathers and Mothers

February 12 Blessed Reginald of Orleans, friar and priest




He was born circa 1183, and died February 1220. He was beatified by Pope Pius IX on July 8, 1875. Blessed Reginald of Orleans was known even during his lifetime for his brilliance, his prayer, his austerity, and his kindness towards others, especially the poor. Originally, a powerful preacher and esteemed canon lawyer associated with the University of Paris, Reginald encountered Dominic in Rome. Captivated by the apostolistic way of life championed by Dominic, Reginald decided to join the newly-founded Order. An illness struck him, however, before he could make his vows. When doctors began to despair of his life, Dominic begged Our Lady to intervene. Blessed Jordan of Saxony recounts that the Queen of Heaven herself appeared to Reginald to heal him, and at the same time, revealed to him the signal element of the Dominican habit: the scapular. As Dominic had been a Canon of St. Augustine, the early brothers made that traditional tunic their habit. This practice was altered as a result of Reginald's vision, and the addition of the full-length white scapular has been indicative of the Dominican habit ever since. Blessed Reginald of Orleans, pray for us.

February 13 Blessed Jordan of Saxony, friar, priest and Master of the Order



He was born circa 1190 near Dassel, Duchy of Saxony, and died circa 1237 at sea, near Syria. He was beatified by Pope Leo XII on February 13, 1825. Jordan belonged to a noble German family of the Counts of Eberstein. He was born in the castle of Borrenstrick, in the diocese of Paderborn. He began his studies in his native land, and was sent to complete them at the University of Paris. While a student he met Saint Dominic and Reginald of Orleans who inspired him by their preaching. He received the habit on Ash Wednesday, 1220. Jordan was a Master of Arts and a authority on grammar, and taught in the schools of Paris. On August 6, 1221 Dominic died and in 1222 Jordan was elected as his successor as Master General of the Order of Preachers, during his administration the order increased to over 300 priories. Through his lectures in university towns he brought over 1000 professors and students to join the Order from universities throughout Europe. Jordan died, at the age of 47, in a shipwreck on his return from Palestine, where he was visiting local monasteries of the Order. Blessed Jordan of Saxony, pray for us.
