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Pastor's Corner

The Three "Ordinary" Feasts after Pentecost

The Easter season ends with the feast of Pentecost, exactly fifty days after the celebration of the Resurrection. After Easter, we go back to "ordinary" time. If you have been to daily Mass this week, you would have seen the green vestments that are the hallmark of the season of Ordinary Time. But for the next two Sundays, we will have feasts where the liturgical color are white, leading the unsuspecting to think we were still in the Easter season. But no, these are feasts for Ordinary Time.

Trinity Sunday is not a feast that recalls a specific event, but rather it celebrates a central tenant of our faith: the mystery of God's inner life. We needed Jesus to reveal that mystery to us. Many philosophers throughout the ages agree that human reason can "figure out" that there is one God. But we needed divine self-revelation to tell us about God's inner triune nature; human reason could not have to that conclusion based on what we can know. I think the placement of this feast tells us something of what the Church is trying to teach us: for we who believe in Christ, our sharing in the life of the Most Holy Ministry is not extraordinary, but the ordinary way of being for a Christian. We experience and share in the life of the God of the universe in every moment of every day! What astonishing ordinariness!

Next Sunday we will celebrate Corpus Christi. It is a reminder and, in a way, an intensification of Holy Thursday. On that evening, we recall Jesus' institution of the Eucharist and its intimate connection with Jesus' Passion and Resurrection. On the feast of Corpus Christi, we recall not so much the events of Holy Thursday, but Jesus' actual, real presence in the Eucharistic elements. So this feast too points us to a central Catholic belief rather than an event in salvation history. Corpus Christi reminds us that not only did the second person of the Most Holy Trinity become incarnate of the Virgin Mary, but that he now abides in our midst under the appearance of bread and wine and that he invites us to take him into ourselves! Think about it: God becomes the spiritual food of creatures! Yet this is precisely what happens when we receive Holy Communion; it's "ordinary" for us!

Finally, on the Friday following Corpus Christi, we will celebrate the last major post-Pentecost feast: the Sacred Heart of Jesus. (The Immaculate Heart of Mary is celebrated the next day, but it does not have the liturgical weight of these others.) This feast reminds us of God's motivation for action in human history: love. It was introduced by the Society of Jesus, the Jesuits, in a time when many Christians' understanding of the faith was overly cerebral and intellectual. The irony, of course, is that the Jesuits are perceived as cerebral and intellectual to a fault! Divine love is the lens through which Christians should interpret all of salvation history, even the Old Testament. As any parent will tell you, sometimes we need "tough love." But again, it is God's love that is the "ordinary" experience of Christians. No matter what has happened or is happening in our lives, the one constant, the one thing that never changes is the fundamental aspect of God. St. Peter only began to sink when he took his eyes off Jesus. All Christians should have our eyes on Jesus, on God, no matter what storms we are in the middle of!

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Dominican Saints & Blesseds

May 24 Translation of Our Holy Father Dominic

This is the day 12 years after the death of St. Dominic that his remains were transferred to his new marble sepulcher. Bl. Jordan of Saxony's account: "The upper part of the coffin was moved a little bit. As soon as the stone was taken away, the body gave forth a wonderful odor through the opening; its sweetness astonished those present, and they were filled with wonder at this strange occurrence. Everyone shed tears of joy, and fear and hope in all hearts. We, ourselves, also smelled the sweetness of this perfume, and we bear witness to what we have seen and smelt. Eager with love, we remained devotedly near the body of Dominic for a long time, and we were unable to sate ourselves with this great sweetness. If one touched the body with a hand or belt or some other object, the odor immediately attached itself to it for a long time." Holy Father Dominic, pray for us.

May 27 Blessed Andrew (Francisco) Franchi, friar and bishop

Born 1335? Died May 26, 1401. Beatified In 1921 by Pope Benedict XV Andrew was born of a noble family, he embraced the Dominican vocation about the year 1351 and soon earned a doctorate of theology degree at Rome. Renowned as a teacher, spiritual director and preacher, his great administrative abilities were likewise extolled, and he was made a prior of several houses of the order. As Bishop he continued to live as a Dominican Friar. It was reported that he spent his income as bishop on the poor. Blessed Andrew, pray for us.

May 28 Blessed Mary Bartholomew Bagnesi, lay Dominican and virgin

Born August 15, 1514 in Florence, Italy. Died May 28, 1577. Beatified on July 11, 1804 by Pope Pius VII. Mary was a beautiful child, who was unfortunately neglected by her mother. Her sister, a Dominican Nun, for the most part raised her in the convent, where she entertained the sisters with songs and prayers. When she came of age to marry, she was vehemently opposed to the idea. She had a violent reaction to the idea and was in a coma for 10 days, and upon recovering from the coma she could not walk. The doctors of the day tried many things to no avail. As an invalid she could not become a Dominican nun so she joined the third order. Her small room in the convent became a sort of oratory. Mass was offered each day there and she received many visitors asking for advice and spiritual direction. She was in rapture and ecstasies during the last years of her life and was observed to levitate on occasion. Blessed Mary, pray for us.

May 29 Blessed William Arnaud, friar and priest

Born 1242? Died on May 29, 1242. Beatified on October 6, 1866 by Pope Pius IX. Little is known of William before 1234 when Pope Gregory IX appointed him Inquisitor for the Diocese of Toulouse. He was evidently a native of Montpellier and



he had a reputation for canonical learning. His activity in the repression of heresies stirred up such hostility that he was banished from Toulouse, although he is said to have affected many conversions by his sweetness and charity. On that fateful day in 1242, Raymond of Alfar, the bailiff of count Raymond VI of Toulouse, pretending friendship, lured William and 11 Associates to his castle at Avignonet, where he attacked and killed them. Miracles and cures reported at the time of their death and afterward gave rise to the cult which was confirmed by Pious IX,. Blessed William, pray for us.

May 30 Blessed James Salomoni(o), friar and priest

Born 1231 in Venice. Died on May 31, 1314 in Forli. Beatified June 26, 1526. James was born to the Noble House of Solomon, one of the oldest patrician houses of Venice; his mother raised him after his father died though his mother later became a Cistercian nun at which stage his maternal grandmother raised him. He became a Dominican in 1248 and became the prior of houses at several places such as Faenza and San Severino. But Forli was where he settled for the remainder of his life. He gained fame for healing as well as for his prophetic abilities obtained through an aesthetic state. From 1269 he lived at a Dominican Convent in Forli and was called the father of the poor. He also earned fame for being the person who received the confession of Carino of Balsamo - the murderer of Peter of Verona- and became his spiritual director. James suffered from cancer but was cured sometime before his death in 1314. He was serving in the choir when he suffered a sudden heart attack and died. Jame's remains were conserved in an urn at Flori but in 1939 were translated to Venice to The Basilica of Saint Joseph and Paul. Pope Gregory XV approved his cult for the Dominicans in 1622. Blessed James, pray for us.
